

# Crochet Pattern

Skill level: Intermediate

# About this pattern

The toy is crocheted in continuous spirals without joining the rounds. You will need a stitch marker to keep track of where the beginning of each round starts. Move the marker up to the first stitch of the next round after finishing the previous one.

If you don't have a stitch marker you can always use a scrap of contrasting yarn instead. You can see it in my photos.

I use USA terminology for my pattern (don't worry if you use UK terms, all the differences are explained in the pattern).

# Finished size

Finished size approx. 30 cm (11.8 inches) tall using the materials stated in the pattern.

# Materials and tools

- ✓ Yarn:
- <u>Grey</u> color for the main parts any moderately fluffy yarn. I used 40 g of "Kid Royal" by Alize (Lace, 62% Mohair, 38% Nylon (Polyamide); 250 meters/25 grams) working in 2 strands.
- <u>Black</u> color for the main parts any moderately fluffy yarn. I used
   20 g of "Kid Royal" by Alize (Lace, 62% Mohair, 38% Nylon (Polyamide); 250 meters/25 grams) working in 2 strands.
- <u>Pink</u> color for the inner parts of the ears any moderately fluffy yarn. I used 10 g of "Kid Royal" by Alize (Lace, 62% Mohair, 38% Nylon (Polyamide); 250 meters/25 grams) working in 2 strands.
- <u>Black smooth</u> yarn for the nose I used 100% wool, 100g/500 m.
- <u>White smooth</u> yarn for the whites of the eyes (optional) small amount. You can make the whites of the eyes using white polymer clay instead (instructions are given).

*Note:* All yarn should be of the same weight/meterage!

- ✓ Crochet hook. I used 1.75 mm (approximately US steel hook 6, UK steel hook 3 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>).
- ✓ Small amount of white polymer clay for the white of the eyes. You can crochet the whites of the eyes instead (instructions are given).
- ✓ Two small black beads for the pupils of the eyes or safety eyes. I used 1 mm in diameter.
- $\checkmark~$  Any stuffing.
- ✓ Single core copper electrical wire (or steel wire) 1 mm diameter for the arms, legs and tail. I used approximately 100 cm (approximately 40 inches). Use only copper or steel wire for the



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frame as they can better stand bending compared to aluminum. You can buy it at electric supplies stores or craft store as wire for making jewelry.

- ✓ Tapestry needle.
- ✓ Strong thread for tightenings.
- ✓ Transparent glue.
- ✓ Coarse needle for felting (if you will felt the mouth).
- ✓ Small amount of black wool for felting or black embroidery thread for the mouth.
- ✓ Fishing line for whiskers.
- ✓ Any material for tinting. I used oil pastel.




✓ Velcro or brush for brushing up the toy.



#### Tip (make it right)

If there are no special notes, the toy is crocheted under both parts of the loop. In some rows, there are special notes: 'into the front loop only' or 'into the back loop only'. In that case, you need to follow these instructions.



#### TIP (yarn and wire)

If you use different yarn, the toy will be bigger or smaller and you will need more or less yarn and wire than stated in the pattern (i.e. thicker yarn will produce a larger toy and you may require more yarn and wire).

If you decide to use thicker yarn you should buy thicker wire as well. The thicker your yarn the taller the toy will be.

#### Tip (gauge)

When making toys, you should use a much smaller hook than recommended for the yarn you choose.

Make sure you crochet tight enough; otherwise, the stuffing will show through the holes.

When making toys the right side looks like this:



And the backside looks like this:




## Abbreviations

ch(s) = chain(s) inc(s) = increasing(s) (2 sc in 1 st) st(s) = stitch(es) dec(s) = decreasing(s) (sc2tog) sc2tog = single crochet two stitches together sl st = slip stitch sc(s) = single crochet(s) rnd = round

If there is a record in the brackets in the pattern, multiplied by some number, for example (3 sc, 1 inc) x 3, it means you need to repeat this action 3 times, that is 3 sc, 1 inc, 3 sc, 1 inc, 3 sc, 1 inc.

# Tip (shift stitch)

While working, you will need to keep the work symmetrical. As work tends to twist to the right you need to adjust position of the marker periodically (beginning of round). If you notice that marker moves right, you need to work one extra stitch in the end of round and move marker for one stitch (now 2nd st of the round becomes 1st). This is shift stitch – it is not included in description of rounds.

Usually you have to do shift stitches every 3-5 rounds (depending on the yarn, hook and your gauge). To check if it is time to work shift stitch fold your work in half and check if marker still goes straight.



## Head

# Tip (marker)

The marker goes from the nose to the top of the head along the center of the head. Do not remove the marker until the toy is finished.

## Stuff firmly but do not overstuff.

- **1 Rnd:** 6 sc in magic ring = 6 sts
- **2 Rnd:** 6 inc = 12 sts
- **3 Rnd:** (3 sc, 1 inc) x 3 = 15 sts
- **4 Rnd:** 1 sc in each st around = 15 sts
- **5 Rnd:** (4 sc, 1 inc) x 3 = 18 sts
- **6 Rnd:** 1 sc in each st around = 18 sts
- 7 **Rnd:** (5 sc, 1 inc) x 3 = 21 sts
- 8 Rnd: 1 sc in each st around = 21 sts

**35 Rnd:** (14 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec) x 2, 14 sc = 48 sts **36 Rnd:** 13 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec, 12 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec,

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#### 13 sc = 44 sts


**37 Rnd:** 3 sc, 1 dec, 7 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec, 10 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec, 7 sc, 1 dec, 3 sc = 38 sts

**38 Rnd:** 3 sc, 1 dec, 5 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec, 8 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec, 5 sc, 1 dec, 3 sc = 32 sts

**39 Rnd:** 2 sc, 1 dec, 4 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec, 6 sc, 1 dec, 1 sc, 1 dec, 4 sc, 1 dec, 2 sc = 26 sts

**40 Rnd:** 1 sc, 1 dec, 4 sc, (2 dec, 4 sc) x 2, 1 dec, 1 sc = 20 sts

Bend the wire in half. Insert one end between Rnds 37 and 38 and the other end between Rnds 33 and 34 leaving 4 sts between them. Wire loop should be inside the head for the length of 5 cm (1.9 inches). Stuff firmly but do not overstuff. The wire should be inserted on the opposite side of the stitch marker



**41 Rnd:** (2 sc, 1 dec) x 5 = 15 sts **42 Rnd:** (1 sc, 1 dec) x 5 = 10 sts **43 Rnd:** dec to close the opening. Fasten off and weave in loose ends.


## Body

The marker goes along the center of the back. Start with grey yarn. I crochet the first Rnd of the body using the stitches of the back bottom part of the head.

**1 Rnd:** Crochet 28 sl st directly onto the head to form a circle (see picture) = 28 sts

Use pictures as a reference. Make sure wire ends are

#### inside of the Rnd 1 circle of the body.



2-8 Rnds: 1 sc in each st around = 28 sts
9-11 Rnds: 1 dec, 12 sc, 1 inc, 13 sc = 28 sts
Form 4 fingers. Make sure that the tips of the fingers almost reach the tip of the nose.

There are 2 options how you can work up the arms with yarn. Look at the section "<u>Arms, legs and tail"</u> and choose how you want to make arms before you fold and twist fingers. My Rat's arms made like this:

Fold the wire for the fingers as shown in the picture, making concertina fold (also known as a zigzag fold).



Twist all fingers and then the arms.



12 Rnd: 7 sc, insert the right arm, ch 1, skip 1 st, 12 sc, insert the left arm, ch 1, skip 1 st, 7 sc = 28 sts
13 Rnd: 1 dec, 12 sc, 1 inc, 13 sc = 28 sts
Change to black yarn.
14 Rnd: 1 dec, 12 sc, 1 inc, 13 sc = 28 sts
15 Rnd: 1 dec, 26 sc = 27 sts

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Stuff the body firmly as you go. **16 Rnd:** 1 dec, 12 sc, 1 inc, 12 sc = 27 sts 17 Rnd: 1 dec, 25 sc = 26 sts Change to grey yarn. **18 Rnd:** 1 dec, 11 sc, 1 inc, 12 sc = 26 sts **19 Rnd:** 1 dec, 24 sc = 25 sts **20 Rnd:** 1 dec, 11 sc, 1 inc, 11 sc = 25 sts **21 Rnd:** 1 dec, 23 sc = 24 sts Change to black yarn. **22 Rnd:** 1 dec, 10 sc, 1 inc, 11 sc = 24 sts **23 Rnd:** 1 dec, 22 sc = 23 sts **24 Rnd:** 1 dec, 10 sc, 1 inc, 10 sc = 23 sts **25 Rnd:** 1 dec, 21 sc = 22 sts Change to grey yarn. **26-29 Rnds:** 1 dec, 9 sc, 1 inc, 10 sc = 22 sts Change to black yarn. **30-34 Rnds:** 1 dec, 9 sc, 1 inc, 10 = 22 sts Change to grey yarn. **35 Rnd:** 1 dec, 9 sc, 1 inc, 10 = 22 sts **36 Rnd:** 1 dec, 5 sc, (1 inc, 3 sc) x 2, 1 inc, 6 sc = 24 sts **37 Rnd:** 1 dec, 5 sc, (1 inc, 4 sc) x 2, 1 inc, 6 sc = 26 sts **38 Rnd:** 1 dec, 6 sc, (1 inc, 4 sc) x 2, 1 inc, 7 sc = 28 sts **39 Rnd:** 1 dec, 6 sc, (1 inc, 5 sc) x 2, 1 inc, 7 sc = 30 sts **40 Rnd:** 6 sc, 1 inc, 16 sc, 1 inc, 6 sc = 32 sts Change to black yarn. **41 Rnd:** 8 sc, 1 inc, 14 sc, 1 inc, 8 sc = 34 sts **42 Rnd:** 10 sc, 1 inc, 12 sc, 1 inc, 10 sc = 36 sts **43-44 Rnds:** 1 sc in each st around = 36 sts **45 Rnd:** 10 sc, 1 inc, 14 sc, 1 inc, 10 sc = 38 sts 46-47 Rnds: 1 sc in each st around = 38 sts Change to grey yarn. **48 Rnd:** 1 sc in each st around = 38 sts **49 Rnd:** 10 sc, 1 inc, 16 sc, 1 inc, 10 sc = 40 sts **50-52 Rnds:** 1 sc in each st around = 40 sts

Change to black yarn.


**53 Rnd:** 10 sc, 1 inc, 18 sc, 1 inc, 10 sc = 42 sts

**54-56 Rnds:** 1 sc in each st around = 42 sts

**57 Rnd:** 6 sc, 2 double inc, 26 sc, 2 double inc, 6 sc = 50 sts

Change to grey yarn.

**58 Rnd:** 7 sc, 4 inc, 28 sc, 4 inc, 7 sc = 58 sts **59 Rnd:** 8 sc, 3 inc, 36 sc, 3 inc, 8 sc = 64 sts **60 Rnd:** 19 sc, (1 dec, 3 sc) x 5, 1 dec, 18 sc = 58 sts **61 Rnd:** 18 sc, (1 dec, 2 sc) x 5, 1 dec, 18 sc = 52 sts **62 Rnd:** 17 sc, (1 dec, 1 sc) x 5, 1 dec, 18 sc = 46 sts End with a sl st and fasten off. Form the feet and the legs the same way you did for the hands and arms. The length of the leg with toes is about 20 rounds of the body. Stuff the body firmly.



There are 2 options how to finish the bottom of the toy. Option 1: crochet

Join yarn as shown in the picture below and sl st hooking through the opposite sides to close the opening keeping the legs in the opposite corners of the bottom. Adjust stuffing before making the final stitches.

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Fasten off and weave in loose ends.

Option 2: sewing.

If you don't like the seam after crocheting along the bottom, you can sew the opposite parts together following the steps and pictures below kindly suggested by Berta Hesen-Minten (ThReAdTeDs).

1. Pick up the middle stitch in the front center (working from inside to outside all the time).



2. Pick up the next stitch on the opposite side.



3. Continue working in zigzag pulling the thread to close (I did not pull in the picture below so you can see what I mean).



4. Reach one leg.



5. Go through the body back to the center.



- 6. Do the same for the other leg.
- 7. Adjust stuffing before making the final stitches.




8. Weave in loose ends.



## Ear (make 2)

The ear consists of two parts: an inner part and an outer part.



Inner part of the ear Work with pink yarn. **1 Rnd:** 6 sc in magic ring = 6 sts **2 Rnd:** 6 inc = 12 sts **3 Rnd:** (1 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 18 sts **4 Rnd:** (2 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 24 sts **5 Rnd:** (3 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 30 sts **6 Rnd:** (4 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 36 sts End with sl st and fasten off. Outer part of the ear **1 Rnd:** 6 sc in magic ring = 6 sts **2 Rnd:** 6 inc = 12 sts **3 Rnd:** (1 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 18 sts **4 Rnd:** (2 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 24 sts **5 Rnd:** (3 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 30 sts **6 Rnd:** (4 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 36 sts 7 Rnd: (5 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 42 sts 8 Rnd: (6 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 48 sts End with a sl st but do not fasten off for the grey piece.



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Put the pink and grey pieces together with their back sides facing each other.



Sc evenly around with grey yarn hooking through both parts. Go with 2 sc, then the next 2 sc through the grey share the same pink st, repeat to the end of the round.



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Fasten off leaving a tail for sewing. Make the second ear the same way.

## Nose

Work with black smooth yarn.

- **1 Rnd:** 6 sc in magic ring = 6 sts
- **2 Rnd:** 6 inc = 12 sts
- **3-8 Rnds:** 1 sc in each st around = 12 sts
- 9 Rnd: 6 dec = 6 sts

Fasten off leaving a tail for sewing.

Stuff the nose and sew it around the Rnd 2 of the head. Weave in loose ends.



## Finishing

#### <u>Ears</u>

Sew the ears onto the head at Rnd 31 of the head

skipping 2 sts from the neck. The length of the seam amounts to 5 sts. Weave in loose ends.





### **Tightening for the eyes**

Secure yarn at Rnd 27 of the head skipping 11 sts to the left of the marker.



1. Push the needle throughout the head to pull it

out at the opposite (right) side of the head. Pull up the yarn.

2. Skip 2 sts down and insert the needle pushing it throughout the head to pull it out at the opposite (left) side of the head. Pull up the yarn.

Repeat the steps 1-2 one more time. Fasten off and weave in loose ends. You should end up with two eye sockets.



## Tinting

You can tint the toy using any material for tinting you like. If you are experienced in tinting, you can use acrylic fabric paints, pastel or oil paint. Also you may use eye shadows or pencils for tinting. You can do without tinting at all. I tinted the eye sockets with black or dark grey oil pastel.



## *TIP: Tinting using pencils.*

You need sand paper, pencil and a small brush.



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## Arms, legs and tail

Working up arms with yarn

Option 1 (wire may be seen on the tips of fingers).

Use grey yarn for the arms. Slightly move the crocheted body back from the wire frame of the first arm. Put some glue at several places along the wire. Wind the yarn around the wire all the way up the hand. The following pictures are from another pattern but I think you get the idea.



Then wind the yarn around any edge finger up to its tip. Put some glue on the wire of the finger covered with yarn and wind the yarn around the finger in the opposite direction down to the hand.

Then wind the yarn around the hand in different directions the way you bandage the hand. Do the same for the remaining fingers.





After all fingers are covered with yarn, put some glue at several places along the wire of the arm covered with yarn. Wind the yarn around in the opposite direction all the way up to the shoulder. Weave in loose ends and secure them inside with glue.



**Option 2 (wire won't bee seen on the tips of fingers)** kindly suggested by Berta Hesen-Minten (ThReAdTeDs)

Cover the wire where the fingers will be first, so the tip of the fingers will be covered too.



Then bend the fingers and wrap the arm towards the hand starting at the top of the arm.



Criss cross the hand going up and back over each finger.

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Nicely finish the hand before wrapping back to your starting point.



Put some glue at several places along the wire of the arm covered with yarn. Wind the yarn around in the opposite direction all the way up to the shoulder.



### Tail

Take a piece of wire for the tail and fold it with one end being longer that the other one. Attach it at the center of the back bottom part of the body (at Rnd 53). The finished length of the tail for my Rat is approximately 15 cm (5.9 inches).



Twist the tail the way you twisted arms and legs.



Take pink yarn and wind it along the tail.



Slightly brush up the toy with Velcro or brush.



## Legs

Do the same for the legs using grey yarn.



#### Eyes

### Option 1: making using polymer clay

Make two balls using white polymer clay: one should be bigger than the other one. Diameter depends on the toy. It is better if you cut two ovals of white cardboard of different size and try them on the head first.

Also you can make outline of the eye with pins and then make a pattern. Correct the cardboard patterns if necessary.



Use the patterns when making the eyes.

Carefully press the balls against a flat surface to flatten on the back side. DO NOT make them flat on the front side.

If you are satisfied with the size and shape of the pieces, you can try on small beads for the pupil: slightly press the pupil into the eye. Take the pupil out of the eye carefully. Remove clay from the pupil. Bake the eyes following <u>the instructions for your polymer clay</u>. Glue the pupils into the eyes. Glue the eyes into the eye sockets.



Option 2: crochet eyes

If you do not have polymer clay, you can crochet the eyes instead using a pattern kindly suggested by Aino

## Krog (Sabax).

Work with white yarn (the same weight as the main yarn).

**Rnd 1.** sc in magic ring = 6 sts (the back part of the eye)

**Rnd 2.** 6 inc = 12 sts

**Rnd 3.** (1 sc, 1 inc) x 6 = 18 sts

**Rnds 4-7.** 1 sc in each st around = 18 sts

**Rnd 8.** 4 sc, 1 dec, 7 sc, 1 dec, 3 sc = 16 st

**Rnd 9.** (2 sc, 1 dec) x 4 = 12 sts

Add some stuffing.

**Rnd 10.** (2 sc, 1 dec) x 3 = 9 sts

Add some more stuffing (the eye should be soft). **Rnd 11.** (1 sc, 1 dec) x 3 = 6 sts (the front part of the eye)

Fasten off leaving a length of yarn for sewing the eye onto the head, close up the opening. When sewing it on the head, have that "line" where the marker was in the middle against the head. Sew or glue a half bead for the pupil of the eye.



## Mouth

Take a piece of black wool for felting and roll a thin strap. Felt it at the place where the mouth is supposed to be. You can embroider the mouth instead.






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### **Whiskers**

Cut several pieces of fishing line, 7 cm (2.8 cm) each. Fold each piece in half and secure the way you fasten fringe close to the nose.









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
