- Purl Increase (Fig. 8, page 45)
- K2 tog (Fig. 9, page 45)
- Slip 1 as if to **knit**, K2 tog, PSSO (*Figs.* 13a & b, page 46)
- P2 tog (*Fig. 14, page 47*)
- P3 tog (Fig. 15, page 47)

### INSTRUCTIONS RIBBING

With smaller size circular knitting needle, cast on 68{72-76} sts; place a marker to mark the beginning of the round (see Using Circular Knitting Needles and Markers, page 41).

**Rnd 1:** (K1, P1) around.

Repeat Rnd 1 until Ribbing measures approximately 2" (5 cm) from cast on edge, increasing 30{26-22} sts evenly spaced on last rnd (see Increasing Evenly, page 44): 98 sts.

### **BODY**

Change to larger size circular knitting needle.

**Rnds 1-3:** (K1, P3, K1, P9) around.

**Rnds 4-6:** K1, P3, (K 11, P3) around to last 10 sts, K 10.

Rnds 7-9: (K1, P3, K1, P9) around.

**Rnds 10-12:** K8, P3, (K 11, P3) around to last 3 sts, K3.

Rnds 13-15: P7, K1, P3, K1, ★ P9, K1, P3, K1; repeat from ★ around to last 2 sts, P2.

**Rnds 16-18:** K8, P3, (K 11, P3) around to last 3 sts, K3.

### **SHAPING**

Change to double pointed knitting needles when there are too few stitches to use a circular knitting needle (see Using Double Pointed Needles, page 42).

Rnd 1:  $\star$  K1, P3, K1, P2 tog, P7; repeat from  $\star$  around: 91 sts.

Rnd 2: (K1, P3, K1, P8) around.

Rnd 3:  $\star$  K1, P3, K1, P2 tog, P6; repeat from  $\star$  around: 84 sts.

**Rnd 4:** K1, P3, (K9, P3) around to last 8 sts, K8.

Rnd 5:  $\star$  K1, P3, K1, K2 tog, K3, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 70 sts.

**Rnd 6:** K1, P3, (K7, P3) around to last 6 sts, K6.

**Rnd 7:** (K1, P3, K1, P5) around.

Rnd 8:  $\star$  K1, P2 tog, P1, K1, P5; repeat from  $\star$  around: 63 sts.



**Rnd 9:** (K1, P2, K1, P5) around.

**Rnd 10:** K5, P3 tog, (K6, P3 tog) around to last st, K1: 49 sts.

**Rnds 11 and 12:** K5, P1, (K6, P1) around to last st, K1.

**Rnd 13:** ★ P2, P2 tog, K1, P1, K1; repeat from ★ around: 42 sts.

**Rnds 14 and 15:** (P3, K1, P1, K1) around.

Rnd 16: ★ P3, slip 1 as if to knit, K2 tog, PSSO; repeat from ★ around: 28 sts.

**Rnd 17:** (P3, K1) around.

Rnd 18: (P3 tog, K1) around: 14 sts.

Cut yarn leaving an 8" (20.5 cm) length for sewing. Thread yarn needle with end and slip remaining sts on Rnd 18 onto yarn needle; pull tightly to close and secure end.

### INSTRUCTIONS RIBBING

With smaller size circular knitting needle and Black, cast on 48{52-56} sts; place a marker to mark the beginning of the round

(see Using Circular Knitting Needles and Markers, page 41).

Rnd 1: (K1, P1) around.

Repeat Rnd 1 until Ribbing measures approximately 2¾" (7 cm) from cast on edge, increasing 0{4-0} sts evenly spaced on last rnd (see Zeros, page 41 and Increasing Evenly, page 44); cut Black: 48{56-56} sts.

### **BODY**

Change to larger size circular knitting needle.

**Rnds 1 and 2:** With Pink, (P2, K2) around.

Rnds 3 and 4: (K2, P2) around.

**Rnds 5 thru 20{24-24}:** Repeat Rnds 1-4, 4{5-5} times.

### **SHAPING**

Change to double pointed knitting needles when there are too few stitches to use a circular knitting needle (see Using Double Pointed Needles, page 42).

**Rnd 1:** (P2, K2, P2, K2 tog) around: 42{49-49} sts.

**Rnd 2:** (P2, K2, P2, K1) around.

**Rnd 3:** (K2, P2, K1, K2 tog) around: 36{42-42} sts.

**Rnd 4:** K2, P2, (K4, P2) around to last 2 sts, K2.

**Rnd 5:** (P2, K2, K2 tog) around: 30{35-35} sts.

Rnd 6: (P2, K3) around.

**Rnd 7:** (K2, P1, K2 tog) around: 24{28-28} sts.

**Rnd 8:** K2, P1, (K3, P1) around to last st, K1.

**Rnd 9:** (P2, K2 tog) around: 18{21-21} sts.

Rnd 10: (P2, K1) around.

**Rnd 11:** (K1, K2 tog) around: 12{14-14} sts.

Cut yarn leaving an 8" (20.5 cm) length for sewing. Thread yarn needle with end and slip remaining sts on Rnd 11 onto yarn needle; pull tightly to close and secure end.

Needles and Markers, page 41).

Knit every rnd until Body measures approximately  $7{7\frac{1}{2}-8}$ "/  $18{19-20.5}$  cm from cast on edge.

### **SHAPING**

Change to double pointed knitting needles when there are too few stitches to use a circular needle (see Using Double Pointed Needles, page 42).

Rnd 1:  $\star$  K5{6-7}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 36{42-48} sts.

Rnd 2: Knit around.

Rnd 3:  $\star$  K4{5-4}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 30{36-40} sts.

Rnd 4: Knit around.

Rnd 5:  $\star$  K3{4-3}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 24{30-32} sts.

Rnd 6: Knit around.

Rnd 7:  $\star$  K2{3-2}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 18{24-24} sts.

Rnd 8: Knit around.

Rnd 9:  $\star$  K1{2-2}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 12{18-18} sts.

Cut yarn leaving an 8" (20.5 cm) length for sewing. Thread yarn needle with end and slip remaining sts on Rnd 9 onto needle; pull tightly to close and secure end.

Allow the bottom edge to roll.

Rnd 1: Knit around.

Rnd 2: Purl around.

Repeat Rnds 1 and 2 until Body measures approximately  $7\{7\frac{1}{2}-7\frac{1}{2}\}$ "/ 18{19-19} cm from cast on edge.

### **SHAPING**

Change to double pointed knitting needles when there are too few stitches to use a circular knitting needle (see Using Double Pointed Needles, page 42).

Rnd 1:  $\star$  K4{9-4}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 25{30-30} sts.

Rnd 2: Purl around.

**Rnd 3:** (K3, K2 tog) around: 20{24-24} sts.

Rnd 4: Purl around.

**Rnd 5:** (K2, K2 tog) around: 15{18-18} sts.

Rnd 6: Purl around.

**Rnd 7:** (K1, K2 tog) around: 10{12-12} sts.

Cut yarn leaving an 8" (20.5 cm) length for sewing. Thread yarn needle with end and slip remaining sts on Rnd 7 onto yarn needle; pull tightly to close and secure end.

Fold edge of Hat up 1½" (4 cm).

Change to double pointed knitting needles when there are too few stitches to use a circular knitting needle (see Using Double Pointed Needles, page 42).

Rnd 1:  $\star$  K7{8-7}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 40{45-48} sts.

Rnd 2: Knit around.

Rnd 3:  $\star$  K6{7-6}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 35{40-42} sts.

Rnd 4: Knit around.

Rnd 5:  $\star$  K5{6-5}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 30{35-36} sts.

Rnd 6: Knit around.

Rnd 7:  $\star$  K4{5-4}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 25{30-30} sts.

Rnd 8: Knit around.

**Rnd 9:** (K3, K2 tog) around: 20{24-24} sts.

Rnd 10: Knit around.

Rnd 11: K2 tog around: 10{12-12} sts.



Cut yarn leaving an 8" (20.5 cm) length for sewing. Thread yarn needle with end and slip remaining sts on Rnd 11 onto yarn needle; pull tightly to close and secure end.

Allow the bottom edge to roll.

### INSTRUCTIONS **BAND**

With smaller size circular knitting needle, cast on 13 sts.

Row 1: K1 tbl, P1, (K1, P1) 5 times, with yarn in **front**, slip 1 as if to **purl**.

Row 2: K1 tbl, K1, (P1, K1) 5 times, with yarn in **front**, slip 1 as if to **purl**.

Repeat Rows 1 and 2 until Band measures approximately 16{19-22}"/ 40.5{48.5-56} cm from cast on edge.

Bind off all sts in pattern, leaving a long end for sewing.

Thread yarn needle with long end and sew cast on edge and bound off edge together.

### **BODY**

With larger size circular knitting needle and beginning at seam, pick up 90 sts around working in ends of rows on Band (Fig. 16, page 47); place a marker to mark beginning of the round (see Circular Knitting Needles and Markers, page 41).

When instructed to slip a stitch, with yarn at **back**, slip it as if to **purl**.

**Rnd 1:** (K1, YO, slip 1) around: 135 sts.

Rnd 2: ★ YO, slip 1, P2 tog (YO and slipped st); repeat from ★ around.

Rnd 3: ★ K2 tog (YO and slipped st), YO, slip 1; repeat from ★ around.

Repeat Rnds 2 and 3 until piece measures approximately  $6\frac{2}{6}\frac{4-7}{7}$  16.5 $\frac{17-18}{9}$  cm from bottom edge of Band, ending by working Rnd 3.

### **SHAPING**

Change to double pointed knitting needles when there are too few stitches to use a circular needle (see Using Double Pointed Needles, page 42).

Rnd 1: ★ YO, K4 tog, P2 tog, (YO, slip 1, P2 tog) 7 times; repeat from ★ around: 120 sts.

Rnd 2:  $\star$  K2 tog, YO, slip 1; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 3:  $\star$  YO, slip 1, P2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnds 4-6: Repeat Rnds 2 and 3 once, then repeat Rnd 2 once more.

Rnd 7:  $\star$  YO, K4 tog, P2 tog, (YO, slip 1, P2 tog) 6 times; repeat from  $\star$  around: 105 sts.

Rnd 8:  $\star$  K2 tog, YO, slip 1; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 9:  $\star$  YO, slip 1, P2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 10:  $\star$  K2 tog, YO, slip 1; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 11: ★ YO, K4 tog, P2 tog, (YO, slip 1, P2 tog) 5 times; repeat from ★ around: 90 sts.

Rnd 12:  $\star$  K2 tog, YO, slip 1; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 13:  $\star$  YO, slip 1, P2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 14:  $\star$  K2 tog, YO, slip 1; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 15: ★ YO, K4 tog, P2 tog, (YO, slip 1, P2 tog) 4 times; repeat from ★ around: 75 sts.

Rnd 16:  $\star$  K2 tog, YO, slip 1; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 17:  $\star$  YO, slip 1, P2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 18:  $\star$  K2 tog, YO, slip 1; repeat from  $\star$  around.

Rnd 19: ★ YO, K4 tog, P2 tog, (YO, slip 1, P2 tog) 3 times; repeat from ★ around: 60 sts.

**Rnd 20:** (K2 tog, P1) around: 40 sts.

Rnd 21: (K1, P1) around.

Cut yarn leaving an 8" (20.5 cm) length for sewing. Thread yarn needle with end and slip remaining sts on Rnd 21 onto yarn needle; pull tightly to close and secure end.

Knit every rnd until piece measures approximately  $8\frac{1}{2}\{8\frac{3}{4}-9\}$ "/
21.5{22-23} cm from cast on edge.

Rnd 4:  $\star$  K5{6-7}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 66{77-88} sts.

Rnds 5 and 6: Knit around.

Rnd 7:  $\star$  K4{5-6}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 55{66-77} sts.

Rnd 8: Knit around.

Rnd 9:  $\star$  K3{4-5}, K2 tog; repeat from  $\star$  around: 44{55-66} sts.

Rnd 10: Knit around.

Cut Variegated.

Rnd 11: With Purple, knit around.

Rnd 12: Purl around.

Rnds 14 and 15: Purl around.

Cut Purple.

Rnds 17 and 18: Knit around.



Rnds 2 and 3: Knit around.

Rnd 4:  $\star$  K8, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from  $\star$  around: 90 sts.

Rnds 5 and 6: Knit around.

Rnd 7:  $\star$  K7, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from  $\star$  around: 80 sts. Rnds 8 and 9: Knit around.

Cut Blue.

Rnd 10: With Grey, knit around.

Rnd 11:  $\star$  K6, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from  $\star$  around: 70 sts.

Rnds 12 and 13: Knit around.

Rnd 14:  $\star$  K5, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from  $\star$  around: 60 sts.

Rnds 15 and 16: Knit around.

Cut Grey.

Rnd 17: With Blue, ★ K4, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from ★ around: 50 sts

Rnd 18: Knit around.

Rnd 19:  $\star$  K3, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from  $\star$  around: 40 sts.

Rnd 20: Knit around.

Rnd 21:  $\star$  K2, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from  $\star$  around: 30 sts.

Rnd 22: Knit around.

Rnd 23:  $\star$  K1, slip 1 as if to knit, K1, PSSO; repeat from  $\star$  around: 20 sts.

Rnd 24: Knit around.

Cut yarn leaving an 8" (20.5 cm) length for sewing. Thread yarn needle with end and slip remaining sts on Rnd 24 onto yarn needle; pull tightly to close and secure end.


### **GAUGE**

Exact gauge is essential for proper size. Before beginning your project, make a sample swatch in the yarn and needle specified in the individual instructions. After completing the swatch, measure it, counting your stitches and rows carefully. If your swatch is larger or smaller than specified, make another, changing needle size to get the correct gauge. Keep trying until you find the size needles that will give you the specified gauge.

### **SIZING**

To determine what size to make, measure around the crown of your head with a tape measure (Fig. 1). As long as the Beanie is made from a yarn with elasticity, the fabric will have some give. You want the band to fit snugly, so choose the size closest to your measurement or slightly smaller. You can also adjust the band size by changing the needle size used for it, and therefore adjusting the gauge and the finished measurement.

### **MARKERS**

As a convenience to you, we have used markers to help distinguish the beginning of a round. Place a marker around the first stitch. You may use a purchased split-ring marker or place a length of contrasting color yarn around the stitch. Move it up at the end of each round; remove it when no longer needed.

### **ZEROS**

To consolidate the lengh of an involved pattern, zeros are sometimes used so that all sizes can be combined. For example, K 0{1-0} means that the first and third sizes would do nothing, and the second size would K1.


# KNITTING IN THE ROUND USING CIRCULAR KNITTING NEEDLES

When you knit a tube as for a hat, you are going to work around on the outside of a circle, with the right side of the knitting facing you.
Using a circular knitting needle, cast on all stitches as instructed.
Untwist and straighten the stitches on the needle to be sure that the cast on ridge lies on the inside of the needle and never rolls around the needle

Hold the needle so that the ball of yarn is attached to the stitch closest to the **right** hand point. Place a marker to mark the beginning of the round.

To begin working in the round, knit the stitches on the left hand point (Fig. 2).




Continue working each round as instructed without turning the work; but for the first three rounds or so, check to be sure that the cast on edge has not twisted around the needle. If it has, it is impossible to untwist it. The only way to fix this is to rip it out and return to the cast on row.

### USING DOUBLE POINTED KNITTING NEEDLES

When working a piece that is too small to use a circular knitting needle, double pointed knitting needles are required. Divide the stitches into thirds and slip one-third of the stitches onto each of 3 double pointed needles, forming a triangle. With the fourth needle, knit across the stitches on the first needle (Fig. 3). You will now have an empty needle with which to knit the stitches from the next needle. Work the first stitch of each needle firmly to prevent gaps. Continue working around without turning the work.



# KNIT 1 THROUGH BACK LOOP (abbreviated K1 tbl)

Knit into the back of the first stitch on the left needle (Fig. 4).



### **SLIP 1 AS IF TO PURL**

When instructed to "slip 1 as if to purl," insert the right needle from right to left into the first stitch on the left needle (Fig. 5) and slip stitch onto the right needle.

### **YARN OVER**

### (abbreviated YO)

A yarn over is simply placing the working strand over the right needle creating an extra stitch.


Since the yarn over produces a hole in the knit fabric, it is used for a lacy effect. On the row following a yarn over, you must be careful to keep it on the needle and treat it as a stitch by knitting or purling it as instructed.

To make a yarn over, you'll loop the working strand over the needle like you would to knit or purl a stitch, bringing it either to the front or to the back of the piece so that it'll be ready to work the next stitch, creating a new stitch on the needle.

### After a knit stitch, before a knit stitch

Bring the yarn forward between the needles, then back over the top of the right hand needle, so that it is now in position to **knit** the next stitch (Fig. 6a).



### After a purl stitch, before a purl stitch

Take yarn over the right hand needle to the back, then forward under it, so that it is now in position to purl the next stitch (Fig. 6b).

### **INCREASES INCREASING EVENLY**

Divide the number of increases required into the number of stitches on the needle. Subtract one from the result and the new number is the approximate number of stitches to be worked between each increase. Adjust the number as needed.

### KNIT INCREASE

Knit the next stitch but do **not** slip the old stitch off the left needle (Fig. 7a). Insert the right needle into the back loop of the same stitch and knit it (Fig. 7b), then slip the old stitch off the left needle

### **PURL INCREASE**

Purl the next stitch but do **not** slip the old stitch off the left needle. Insert the right needle into the back loop of the same stitch from **back** to **front** (Fig. 8) and **purl** it. Slip the old stitch off the left needle.




# **DECREASES**KNIT 2 TOGETHER

(abbreviated K2 tog)

Insert the right needle into the **front** of the first two stitches on the left needle as if to **knit** (*Fig. 9*), then **knit** them together as if they were one stitch.




### KNIT 2 TOGETHER THROUGH BACK LOOP

(abbreviated K2 tog tbl)

Insert the right needle into the **back** of the first two stitches on the left needle (*Fig. 10*), then **knit** them together as if they were one stitch.




### **KNIT 4 TOGETHER**

(abbreviated K4 tog)

Insert the right needle into the **front** of the first four stitches on the left needle as if to **knit** (*Fig. 11*), then **knit** them together as if they were one stitch.

### SLIP 1, KNIT 1, PASS SLIPPED STITCH OVER

(abbreviated slip 1, K1, PSSO)

Slip one stitch as if to knit (Fig. 12a). Knit the next stitch. With the left needle, bring the slipped stitch over the knit stitch just made (Fig. 12b) and off the needle.




### SLIP 1, KNIT 2 TOGETHER, PASS SLIPPED STITCH OVER

(abbreviated slip 1, K2 tog, PSSO)







### **PURL 2 TOGETHER**

### (abbreviated P2 tog)

Insert the right needle into the **front** of the first two stitches on the left needle as if to **purl** (*Fig. 14*), then **purl** them together as if they were one stitch.




### **PURL 3 TOGETHER**

### (abbreviated P3 tog)

Insert the right needle into the **front** of the first three stitches on the left needle as if to **purl** (Fig. 15), then **purl** them together as if they were one stitch.

### **PICKING UP STITCHES**

When instructed to pick up stitches, insert the needle from the **front** to the **back** under two strands at the edge of the worked piece (*Fig. 16*). Put the yarn around the needle as if to **knit**, then bring the needle with the yarn back through the stitch to the right side, resulting in a stitch on the needle.

Repeat this along the edge, picking up the required number of stitches. A crochet hook may be helpful to pull yarn through.
